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
What is Community Benefit?

- Generates a low or negative financial return
- Improves access to healthcare services
- Responds to public health needs
- Enhances the health of the community
- Advances medical or health knowledge through education





About Lakeland Regional Health

Lakeland Regional Health (LRH) offers a comprehensive array of inpatient and outpatient diagnostic and treatment services at its Medical Center, Hollis Cancer Center, and ambulatory care locations. LRH's use of technology is redefining medicine, advancing safe and quality patient care, and promoting health and wellness.

Lakeland Regional Health has been named a Most Wired hospital eight times, twice earning Most Wired Advanced status, since 2013 from the College of Healthcare Information Management Executives. This designation recognizes dedication to creating an exceptional infrastructure and advanced clinical processes guided by technology.

Lakeland Regional Health's Hollis Cancer
Center opened in 2003. In 2016, Lakeland
Regional Health was named one of 101
Hospitals and Health Systems with Great
Oncology Programs by Becker's Hospital
Review. Its cancer program is accredited
with commendation by the American College
of Surgeons' Commission on Cancer, and
its Breast Cancer Program is accredited
through the National Accreditation Program
for Breast Centers. The Lakeland Regional
Health Physician Group provides primary

care and urgent care and physicians in over 40 specialties at more than 18 convenient locations. All primary care locations are recognized by the National Committee for Quality Assurance's Patient-Centered Medical Home Program. In addition, Lakeland Regional Health is an award-winning workplace, rated as a 2020 Making a Difference, Workplace Well-Being Gold Winner by Aetna, honored with the Excellence in Work-Life Balance Award by Constangy Brooks, Smith & Prophete LLP in 2019, listed as one of Forbes' Best Employers in Florida in 2022, and recognized in 2018 as the Best Large Hospital Workplace in Florida by the Florida Hospital Association. Lakeland Regional Health is also home to the Florida Hospital Association's Best Caregiver honoree for 2019.

Lakeland Regional Health Medical Center

is the largest single component of Lakeland Regional Health. The 864-bed hospital is the eighth largest hospital in Florida. With more than 40,000 admissions and over 190,000 Emergency Department visits in 2021, the Medical Center encompasses:

- The nation's second busiest single-site Emergency Departments, garnering international and national recognition, and Polk County's only Children's Emergency Department
- Three state-of-the-art hybrid operating rooms
- Level II Trauma Center with physician subspecialists
- Nationally accredited Chest Pain Center and Echocardiography Lab
- The CARF accredited Bannasch Institute for Advanced Rehabilitation Medicine providing Polk County's only inpatient

- medical physical rehabilitation services to maximize clinical outcomes for those with conditions such as stroke, brain injury, spinal cord injury, major multiple traumas and neurological issues
- An advanced Level III
 Neonatal Intensive Care Unit
- The eight story, state-of-the-art Carol Jenkins Barnett Pavilion for Women and Children featuring a Children's Emergency Department, a 12-bed high acuity Pediatric Intensive Care Unit, surgical suites, private suites for labor and delivery, Polk County's only Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, and units dedicated to pediatric and women's care.

Key Accomplishments of 2022

During 2022 thousands of community members were impacted by the work of our team members through the following initiatives, programs, or events:

- Completion of the Harrell Family Center for Behavioral Wellness a 96-bed facility to provide great access, quality, safety, and programming to meet the needs of community members in and surrounding Polk County.
- Behavioral health education for over 150
 Polk County Sheriff Deputies.
- Closely collaborated with the Florida Department of Health in Polk, Central Florida Healthcare, and the American Cancer society to help kick off the school year for over 200 children with free vaccines, HPV education, and sports physicals.

- Launched ShopTalk, a barbershop health education and screening program. In just two months, the program delivered health education about blood pressure, blood sugar, and prostate cancer to over 40 men.
- Screened over 50 men at the inaugural Hoopin' for Health basketball tournament held in collaboration with the Lakeland Family YMCA.
- Collaborative work with community groups on a variety of health issues including health equity, pedestrian safety, and food insecurity.



Community Health Needs Assessment

Lakeland Regional Health understands that everyone does not have an equal opportunity to thrive and be healthy. The environment in which someone lives can have significant effects on their health.

The Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) process identified cultural competence as an overarching priority/ theme that impacts each of the selected priorities. A culturally competent healthcare system can help improve health outcomes and the quality of care while also addressing health disparities present in the community.

Upon review of our county's current health data and as a result of the CHNA process, Lakeland Regional Health has identified the following areas of need:

- 1. Cultural Competency
- 2. Access to Quality, Coordinated Care
- 3. Cancer Screening and Prevention
- 4. Diabetes
- 5. Heart Disease and Stroke
- 6. Injury Prevention
- 7. Mental Healthcare
- 8. Obesity, Nutrition, and Physical Activity

Priorities were selected, in part, based on issue prevalence and severity according to county data, in addition to input provided by community members and county stakeholders.

Community Snapshot

Geographic Location

Polk County is geographically larger than the state of Rhode Island and equal in size to Delaware. The total area of the County is approximately 1,796 square miles, which makes it the fourth largest county in Florida, exceeded only by Miami-Dade, Palm Beach, and Collier counties.

Population Demographics

Polk County is home to approximately 753,520 residents. The County consists of 17 municipalities, with Lakeland as its largest city having a population of 115,425 residents (2021).

Heart Disease and Stroke	 The Medical Center received American College of Cardiology (ACC) Chest Pain Center with Primary PCI (percutaneous coronary intervention) & Resuscitation Accreditation. The virtual HeartSmarts program relaunched. HeartSmarts helps participants understand cardiovascular disease, cardiac risk factors, and ways to lower their risk for developing cardiovascular disease. Lakeland Regional Health has the only ELSO (Extracorporeal Life Support Organization) certified ECMO (extracorporeal membrane oxygenation) program in Polk County which allows sustained cardiac and respiratory support for patients recovering from heart or lung failure, or heart surgery.

Reimagining Behavioral Healthcare

Good behavioral health means a thriving community, but behavioral health problems can impede someone's ability to realize their potential, cope with stresses, work productively, and make contributions to their communities. The burden of mental illness on a community can create challenges associated with homelessness, poverty, and substance abuse that can cause stress on the community's health, education, and public safety systems. The new Harrell Family Center for Behavioral Wellness is well-positioned to provide greater access, quality, safety, and programming to meet the needs of the citizens of Polk County and surrounding areas in innovative ways that reimagine how behavioral healthcare is delivered.

This 80,000 square foot, state-of-the-art Behavioral Health facility provides patients with convenient, safe, and specialized inpatient and outpatient services. Lakeland Regional Health's design and construction team, along with the Behavioral Health service line team members, created an architectural space that fosters a healing environment. With large open windows that stream natural light to capture the warmth and energy from outside, signs of hope and renewal are integrated into the design. The facility has been specifically designed with patients, families, and community in mind.

The Harrell Family Center for Behavioral Wellness will focus on several areas of service:

- 1. Emergency Stabilization
- 2. Adult Inpatient Care
- 3. Substance Abuse Disorders
- 4. Memory Disorders
- 5. Child and Adolescent Inpatient Services
- 6. Adult Outpatient Care
- 7. Child and Adolescent Outpatient Care
- 8. Family Behavioral Health and Wellness
- 9. Non-Residential Intensive Behavioral Health Programs



Hoopin' for Health

The first annual Hoopin' for Health basketball tournament was hosted in June 2022 during Men's Health Month. Beyond basketball, the tournament is a way to encourage men to take charge of their health through cardio activity and participation in regular health check-ups and screenings.

In 2022, 12 teams took to the court at the Lakeland Family YMCA and over 60 health screenings were performed.

"This event is a great opportunity to remind men to take charge of their health. Preventive screenings, and regular visits to primary care providers are critical components for men to live a long and healthy life."





ShopTalk

Lakeland Regional Health's ShopTalk program focuses on health outreach efforts in places outside the traditional clinic setting, such as barbershops and hair salons, in an effort to support the decrease of health disparities among people of color.

Following the COVID-19 pandemic, Hispanic men experienced the steepest decline in life expectancy with a 3.7-year drop and men generally put off preventative screenings and annual check-ups.

Barbershops and salons continue to be an environment where community members share information, dialogue, and build community. By empowering community members through education, we can encourage them to take control over their health, make healthy lifestyle choices, and seek preventative care.

The program launched in September with 3 local barbershops.




Understanding the Significance of Graduate Medical Education (GME) and Expanding Access to Care

As the leading healthcare provider in Polk County, Lakeland Regional Health is continuously expanding to meet the needs of the community. The Graduate Medical Education Program (GME) will provide more access to physicians and healthcare providers. The first medical residents will arrive in 2023, and once fully operational, the GME program plans to support 150 to 200 medical residents. Unlike students entering other kinds of graduate education, those entering graduate medical education have already successfully completed four years of college as well as four years of post-college medical school.

Physicians-in-training obtain hands-on experience in providing direct patient care under the direction and supervision of teaching physicians that maintain a high standard of care for patients. Residents and medical students expand the capacity of the health system by providing coverage across various service lines and staffing services in difficult-to-recruit specialties.

Currently, seven residencies have received accreditation through the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME). Those include General Surgery, Internal Medicine, Psychiatry, Surgical Critical Care Fellowship, Emergency Medicine, Transitional Year, and Family Medicine.



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
